DIRECTOR NOTES

I have long hoped that Theatre Sheridan would present a play written by Richard Brinsley Sheridan (1751-1816) since our institution is indirectly named after the playwright.

The Rivals is Sheridan's first play. It debuted at London's Covent Garden Theatre in 1775 and was an immediate failure. Sheridan feverishly rewrote the play and it reopened a short time later, whereupon it was deemed to be a smash hit. His characters remain colourful today and, following the success of the play, the word "malapropism" appeared in the dictionary.

The literary style of The Rivals owes much to writers of the Restoration era in the late 17th century. They themselves were influenced by the plays of Molière since, after Charles I was executed by the Puritans in 1649, many English courtiers sought exile in France. When Charles II returned to assume the throne, England joyously embraced the theatrical style called "Comedy of Manners" -- plays that spoof character types and social conventions.

The Rivals – written a century later -- is more accessible to a modern audience than many Restoration plays. Certainly we all know couples whose relationship flounders with miscommunication and game-playing, while the battle between generations continues with each passing decade.

The challenge of the script, of course, is Sheridan's convoluted 18th century language. We have worked long and hard to streamline storylines and action without sacrificing the broad brush-stroke characters that Sheridan penned 234 years ago. The cast has embraced the challenges of extended dialogue and dialect that have taken actors' personal vocal ranges far beyond contemporary 21st century speech patterns.

Above all, we hope the humour of these characters and storylines puts a smile on your face.

Thanks for your support of Theatre Sheridan, and a special thank you to the many students, faculty and staff who have made my past 36 years such a delicious romp. Given my imminent retirement, I am particularly delighted to have had the opportunity to direct The Rivals.

Most of all, I have thoroughly enjoyed the rehearsal process with this dedicated cast and crew. Thank you all. What an ending!


